designed to secure results. Therefore, the only thing we can relate to is control of our communities, self defense, and control of our lives.

"We either make revolution in this country," stated Aaron, "or we don't exist. Our backs are up against the wall... Bobby Joe Conner didn't die because of his name. The police didn't even know

his name. He died because of the color of his skin... We found the police guilty, so they should be executed, but we don't control the legal processes.

"What Blacks do here in America can control the destiny of the world. That's the choice we have to make. Are we gonna let these people continually get away with the things they have

done to Black peoples across the world?"

"You are either a part of the solution, or you are a part of the problem," added Aaron. "If you are a part of the problem, then you should be eliminated... We have no other choice but to relate to the gun, the only thing that can ensure Black survival... The time is short, revolution is a day away."
