## Dean stalls Panther breakfast donation

PSU administrators are trying to put the brakes on student senate executive committee proposal to donate \$300 to the Black Panther breakfast program.

The committee voted last week to donate the money, allocated from incidental fees, to the breakfast program. However administrators are questioning the legality of the plan.

Attorney for the State Board of Higher Education, Ray Underwood, advised PSU's Dean for Students, William Williams to deny the committee request. Underwood said the fees should be used for the educational benefit of students of the institution where they are collected.

Williams said this donation would be an inappropriate use of student funds. He added, "if the committee shows that students at this institution are involved in the program and receiving educational benefit I will take a second look at this proposal."

Williams believes the money is to be merely a gift from PSU. He was informed of the committee's plans by Rude Batties, chairman of the committee.

The Free Breakfast Program was started by Black Panthers to feed children in poor areas each weekday.

The program which depends on donations of time and food to

operate, worked well in other large cities and is being tried in Portland. Most of the food comes from merchants in the area.

Kevin Mulligan of the executive committee proposed the donation. Five of nine members were present and accepted the proposal unanimously.

Joe Bernt, executive committee member said they would get the money for the program somehow, "legally or illegally."

He said the committee should have final say on how the money allotted them is used. The committee will look for some way to get the money out of Williams control, he said.

The 19 were transported to Vale, Ore., Thursday night where they were held at the Malheur County Jail before being taken to Ontario Friday for arraignment.

Bails of \$1,500 each were levied against the group during the court proceedings before Ontario Justice Court Judge Nita Bellows. The proceedings were continued until Saturday while the defendants obtain legal counsel.

State police said the group

included eight women and 11 men — some of them claimed to be members of the Black Panther party. The group was travelling in two station wagons, one of which was pulling a trailer. Police are attempting to obtain a search warrant that would allow them to check the trailer.

THE SUSPECTS told police they were on their way home after travelling through the eastern part of the United States.

FOR THE PAST TWO WEEKS MY PARTNER AND I HAVE BEEN WORKING A SPECIAL DUTY DETAIL IN THE ALBINA AREA. RECENTLY WE HAVE BEEN WORKING WITH A SUBJECT WHO WE DEEM TO BE A RELIABLE INFORMANT DUE TO HIS RECENT DEALINGS WITH ANOTHER LOCAL POLICE AGENCY. WE HAVE BEEN IN CONTACT WITH THAT AGENCY THRU OUR DETAIL SERGEANT, SGT. FORTNER. INFORMATION AND ASSISTENCE PROVIDED TO THEM BY OUR SUBJECT RESULTED IN FELONY ARRESTS.

INFORMANT HAS INDICATED A DESIRE TO PROVIDE US WITH INFORMATION CONCERNING POSSIBLE UPCOMING ACTIVITIES OF THE LOCAL BLACK PANTHER GROUP HEADED BY KENT FORD

INFORMANT HAS MET WITH FORD SEVERAL TIMES DURING THE PAST FEW DAYS IN AN ATTEMPT TO GAIN FOR HIMSELF A PLACE IN THE FORD ORGANIZATION.

DURING A CONVERSATION BETWEEN INFORMANT AND FORD ON 6-14-70, FORD INDICATED TO INFORMANT THAT THE PANTHER ORGANIZATION WAS IN NEED OF FIREARMS. HE TOLD INFORMANT THAT ANY GUNS THAT HE COULD PROVIDE

WOULD BE WELECOME. NFORMANT TOLD FORD THAT HE WOULD TRY TO OBTAIN SOME GUNS. NFORMANT REPORTED TO US AFTER THAT AND SUBSEQUENT MEETINGS BUT UNTIL TODAY HAS PROVIDED NO SOLID INFORMATION.

LAST NIGHT, 6-22-70, NFORMANT CONTACTED FORD AND TOLD HIM THAT HE HAD TWO FIREARMS TO CONTRIBUTE TO THE ORGANIZATION AND THAT HE COULD OBTAIN MORE IN THE FUTURE. HE AGREED TO DELIVER THE GUNS TO FORD TODAY, 6-22-70. THIS EVENING, 6-22-70, NFORMANT MET WITH FORD AT THE MALCOLM X DENTAL CLINIC, 2341 N. WILLIAMS. THIS CLINIC APPARENTLY USED AS AN OFFICE BY FORD. AFTER A BRIEF CONVERSATION NFORMANT DROVE FORD TO 5255 N. VANCOUVER AVE. BY INFORMATION FROM INFORMANT AND OUR OWN OBSERVATIONS, FORDS RESIDES AT THIS ADDRESS WITH HIS GIRLFRIEND.

AT THIS POINT NFORMANT HAD WITH HIM IN HIS AUTO AN OLD SHOTGUN AND AN OLD .22 REVOLVER. HE OFFERED THE GUNS TO FORD. FORD DECLINED THE GUNS AT THAT TIME TELLING NFORMANT THAT HE SHOULD KEEP THE GUNS FOR HIS OWN USE TEMPORARILY. HE STATED THAT THE GUNS AND OTHER GUNS, TO BE OBTAINED BY INFORMANT IN THE FUTURE, WOULD BE TAKEN AT A LATER TIME.

FORD THEN INVITED NFORMANT INTO THE HOUSE AT 5255 N. VANCOUVER. HE TOOK NFORMANT TO A LARGE CLOSET IN THE KITCHEN ON THE FIRST FLOOR OF THE RESIDENCE. SEE DIAGRAM CONNECTED TO THIS REPORT.

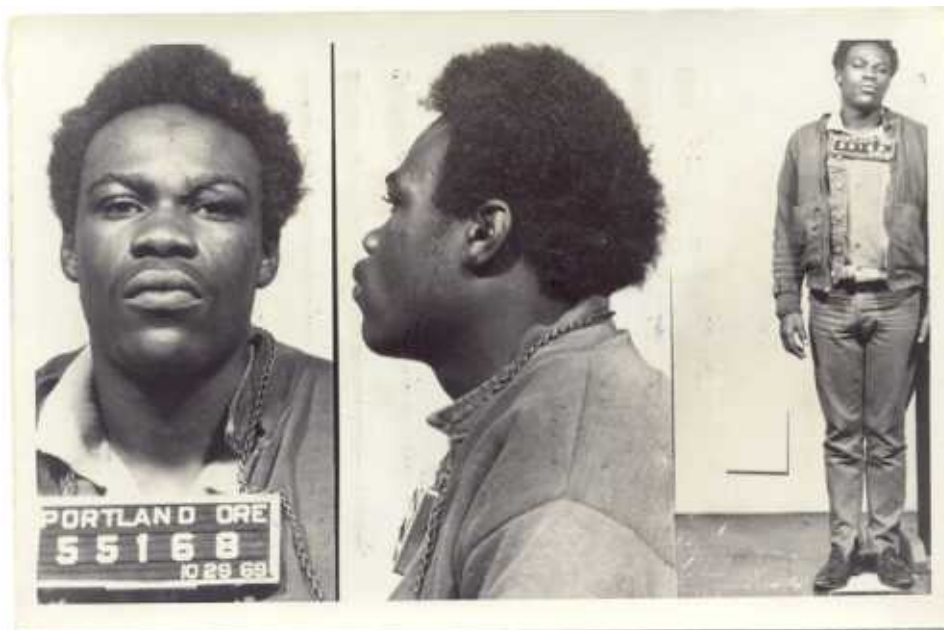
